From Abydos

- 3 Flint knives 1st dyn.
 Slate Palette " " Used for grinding green malachite as paint for the eyes
 2 Baboons, glazed ware, 1st dyn.
 Clay models of offerings, thrown on the Hearth of Ashes of burnt sacrifice when Khufu (Cheops) closed the temples and forbade sacrifices. 14th dyn.
 Glazed beads VIth dyn. The original greenish-grey colour is still visible on a few of the beads.
 Incense of Amenhotep. XVIIIth dyn.
 3 Model stone vases from foundation deposits in the Terrace-Temple of Aahmes I. XVIIIth dyn. (circ. B.C. 1580)
 Kohl-stick, bronze. From the town of the workmen employed on Aahmes I's temple and tomb. XVIIIth dyn.
 2 Ushabti figures, XXIInd dyn. Ushabti figures are models of farm-labourers who do the work of the dead in the underworld. They carry a hoe and pick in their hands, and a basket on the back.
 Lid of jar in which the ushabti figures were found. XXIInd dyn.
 3 Figures of Isis, bronze. XVIIth dyn. (3 listed, only 2 found on arrival)
 False hair. From Shuneh Fort.
 Pottery horse. Roman

 12 Vases XVIIIth dyn. One of these is a pan to hold the burning incense so as to save the bronze incense-burner which would otherwise be burnt out. (16 found)
 12 Vases of late periods.
 3 Vases from Aahmes Town. The long one has the characteristic red glaze of the period. XVIII dyn.
 1 Loom weight. From Aahmes Town. XVIIIth dyn.
 3 Clay beads, probably net-sinkers. From Aahmes Town. XVIIth dyn.
 Ibis jar. XXIInd dyn. From Shuneh Fort.
 1 Pottery vase Abydos XXVth dyn.
